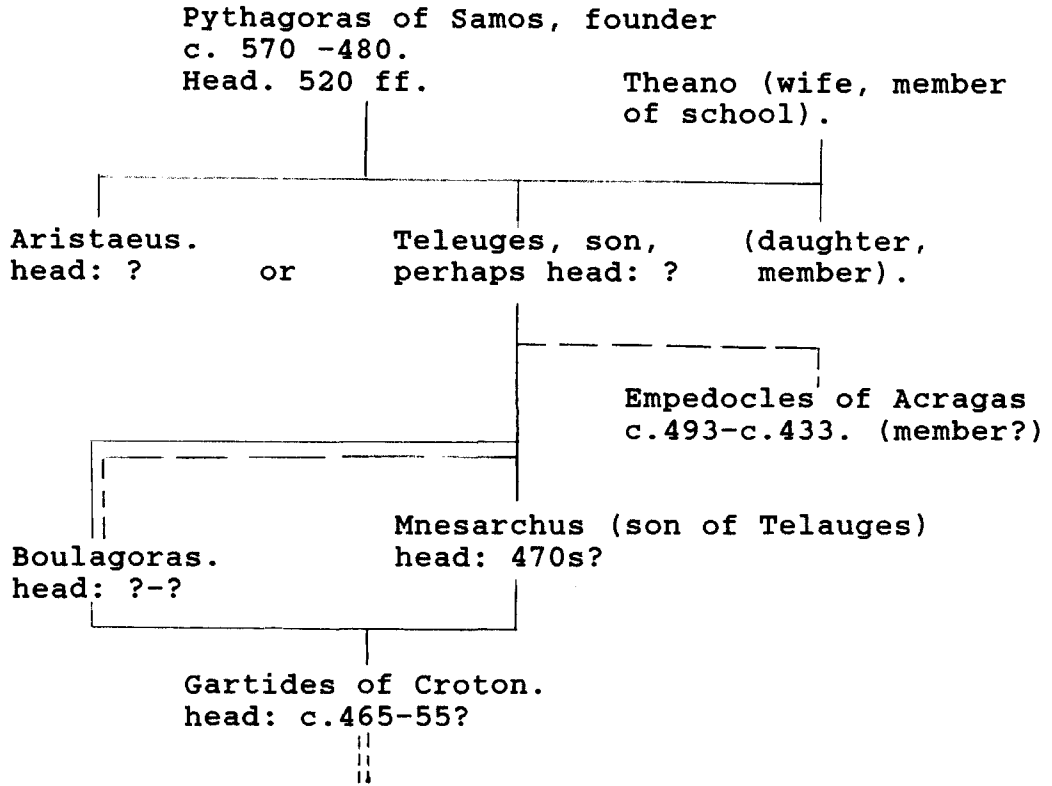

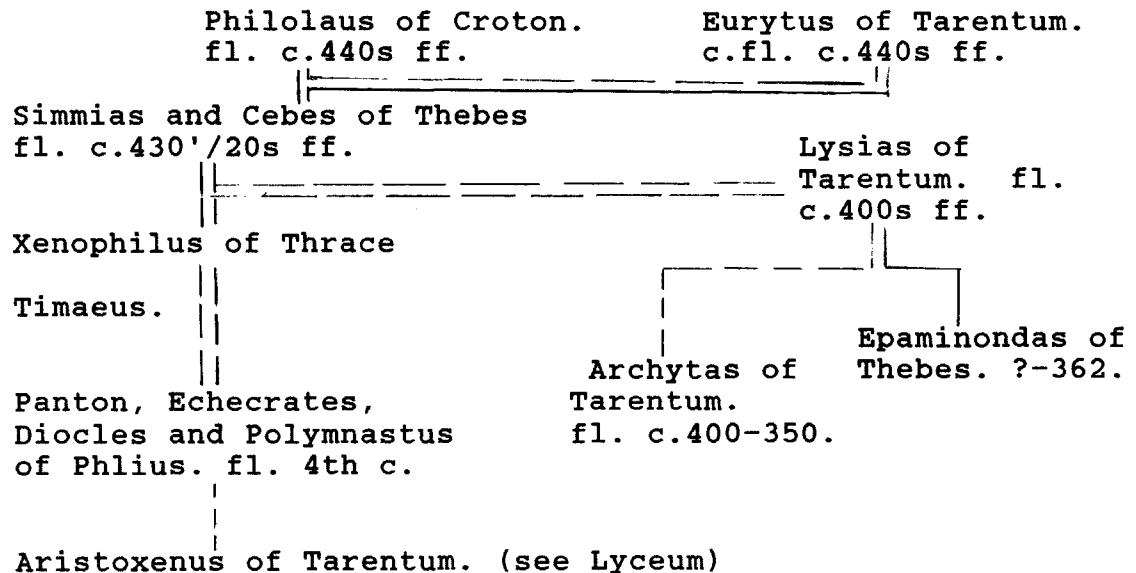

THE PYTHAGOREANS: The School of Croton.
 (Dates are B.C.).



During the headship of Gartides the Society was violently expelled from Croton. Remnants of it continued in a number of Italian and Greek poleis; i.e. Rhegium, Tarentum, Phlius, Thebes. By the close of the third century b.c. however the school and its offshoots ceased to exist as organised associations.

From c. 300-mid 1st c. Pythagoreanism is dormant.

From the 1st c. Pythagoreanism is represented only by a few individuals of note by which time it merges with Middle and Neoplatonism in the centuries a.d.

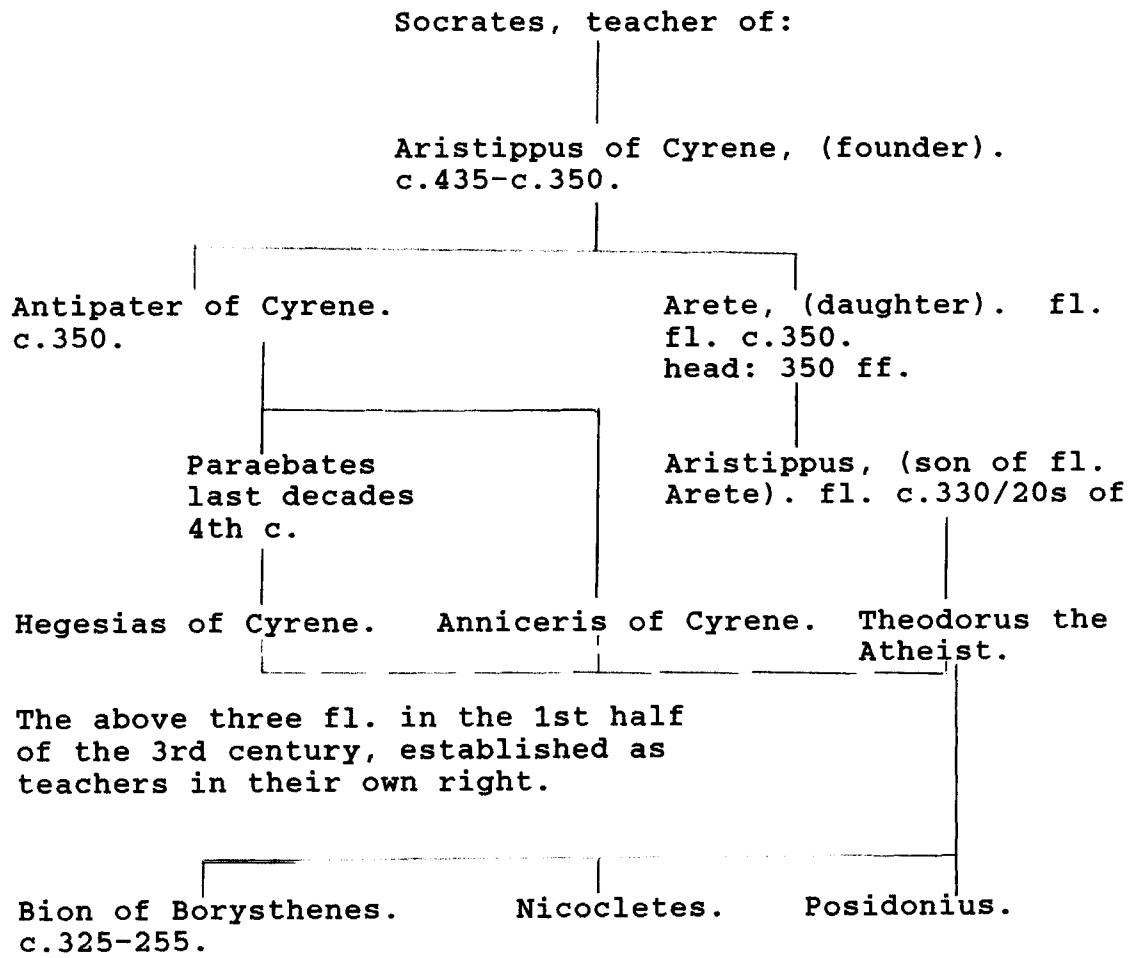

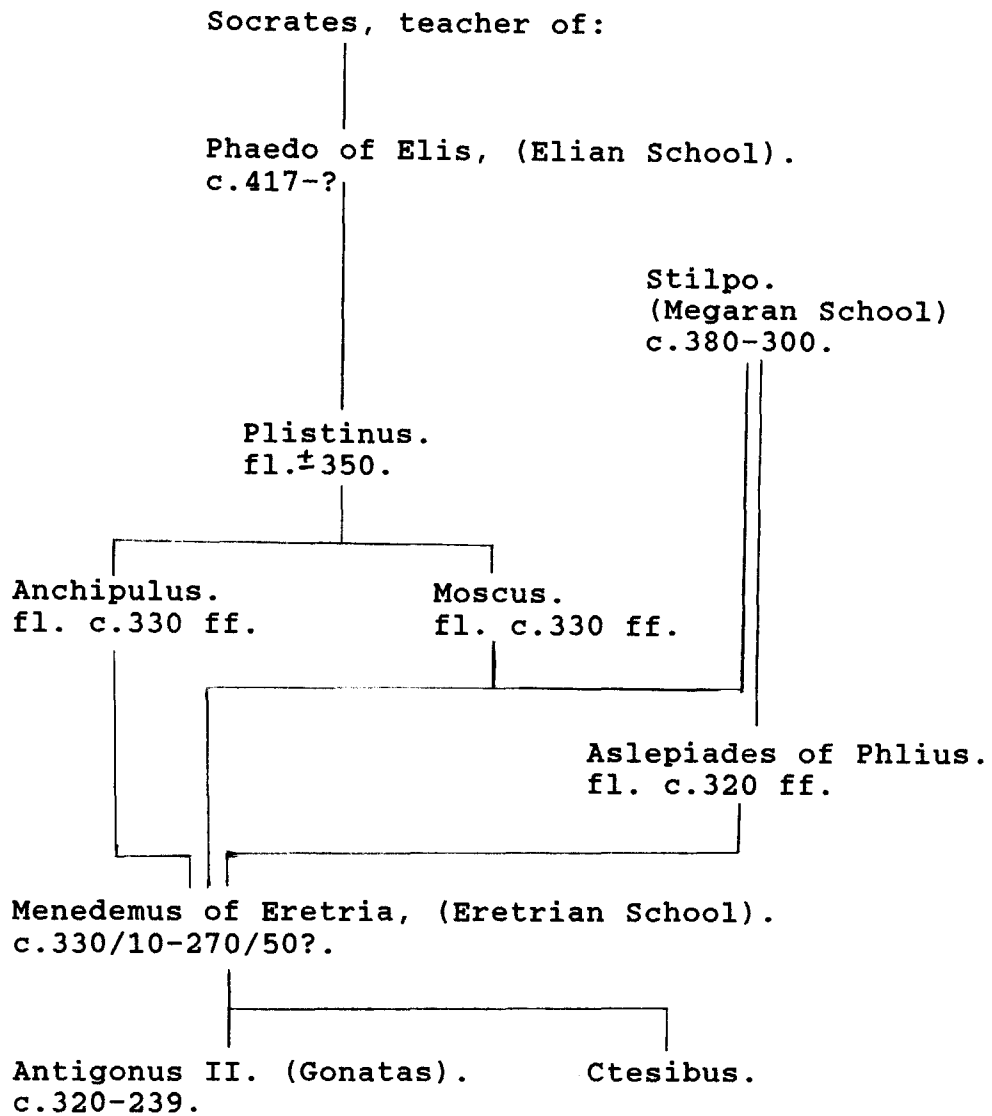

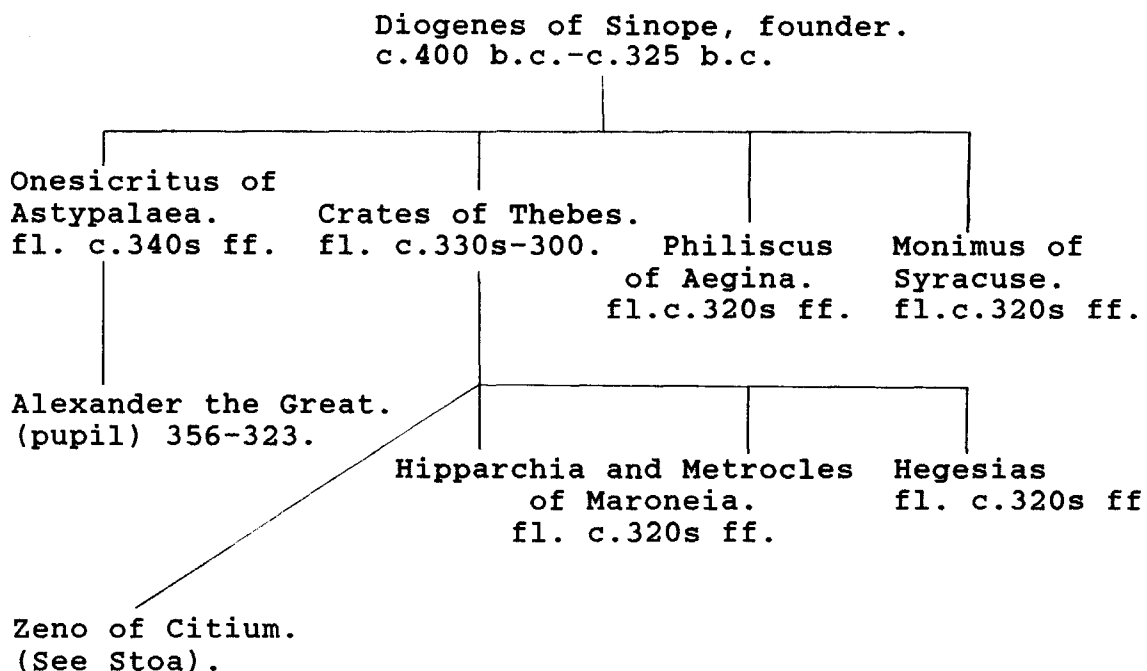
THE CYRENAICS.

THE CYNICS.



The Cynics were never a school. The fourth century b.c. association of individuals calling themselves Cynics comes to an end with that century. After this period there were only individual persons wandering the Ancient world as itinerant teachers-moralists under the general rubric of Cynicism. Few were genuine philosophers.

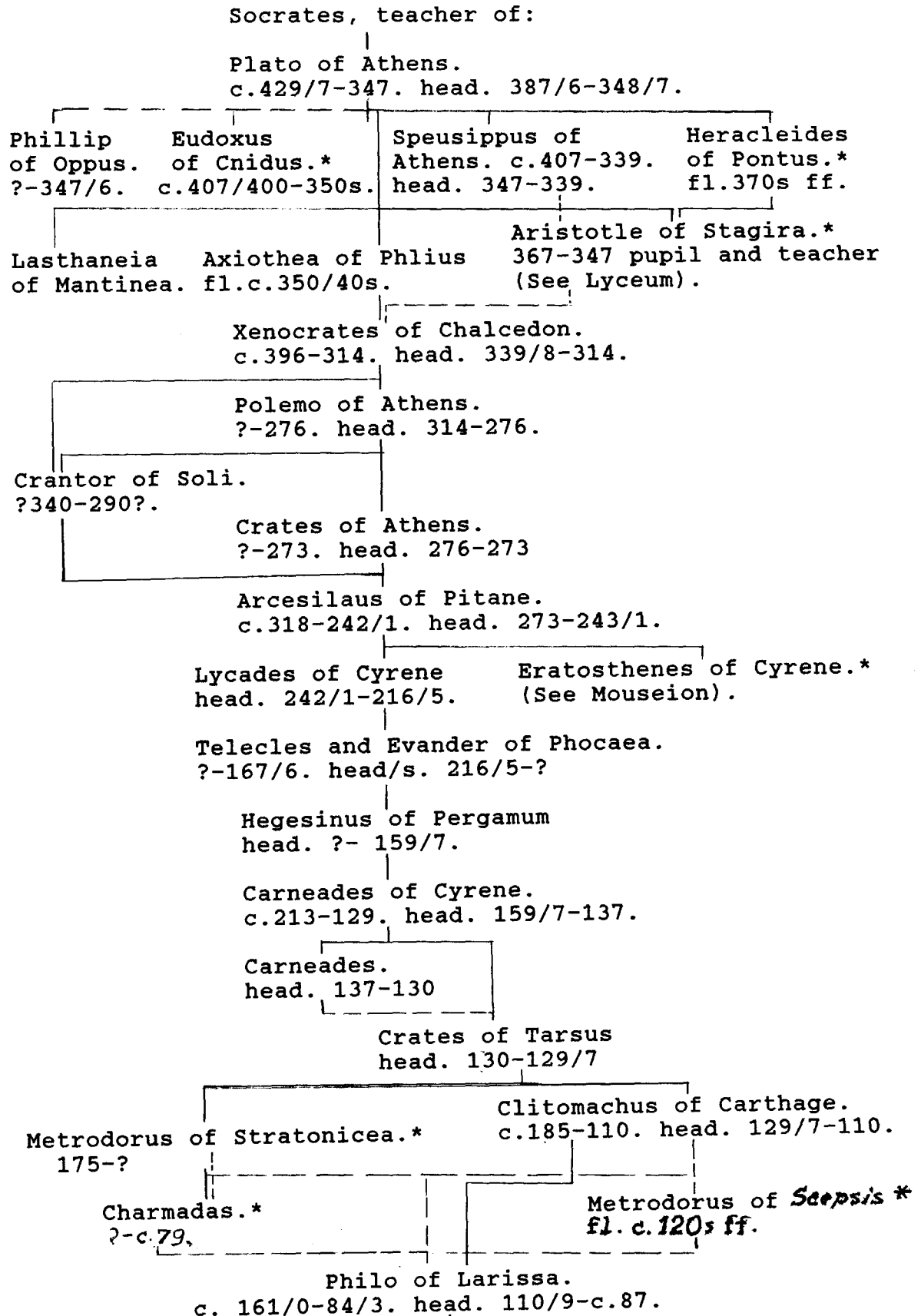

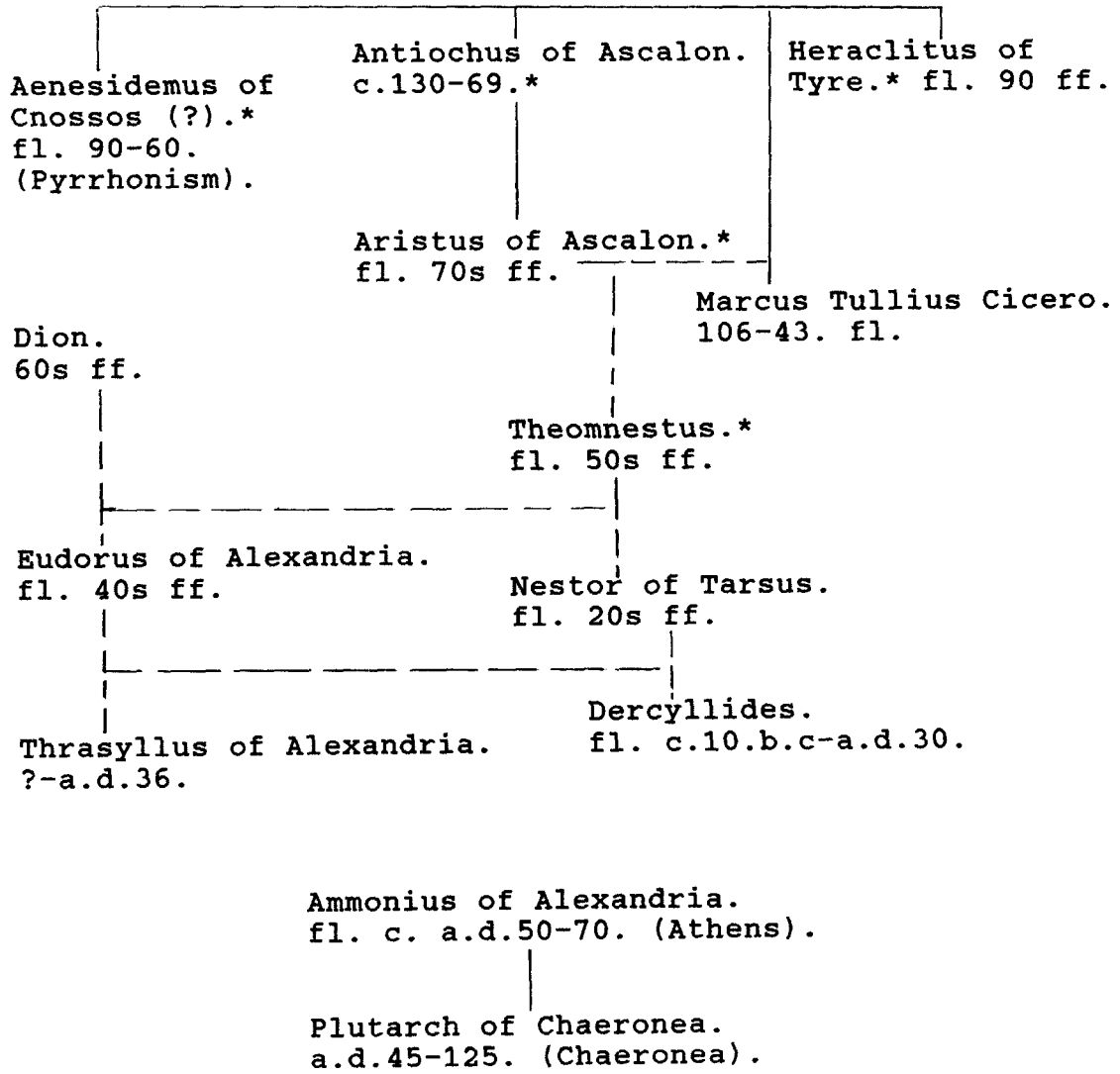

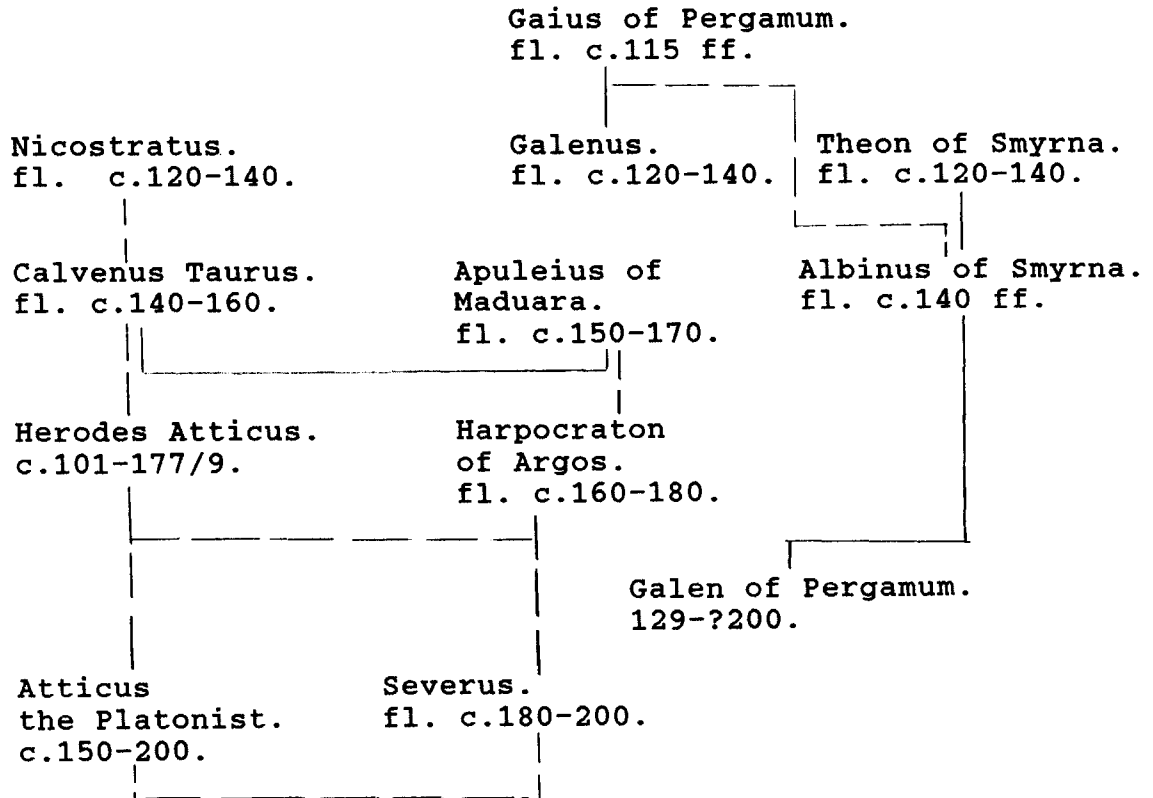


MIDDLE PLATONISM: Athens/Alexandria/Rome/Pergamum/Smyrna.

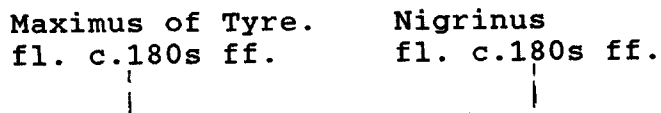

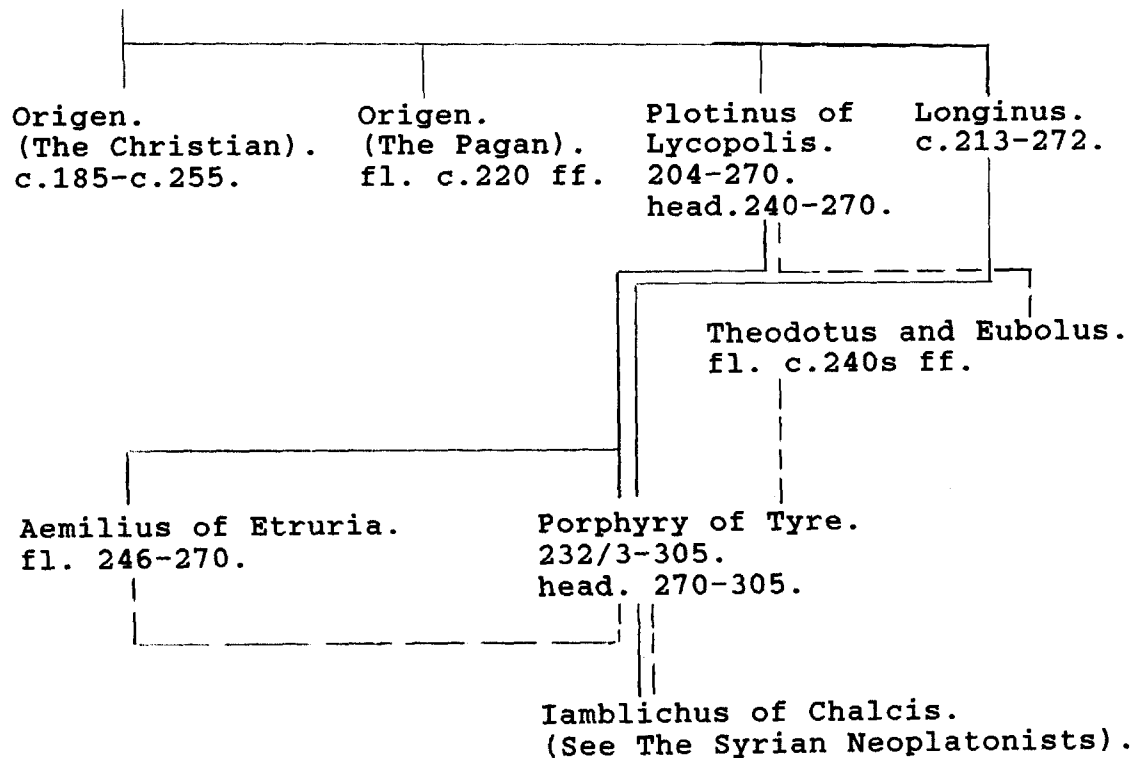
