PROCEEDINGS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF SYDNEY INSTITUTE OF CRIMINOLOGY 1967-1984

In 1968 the then Minister for Justice, The Honourable J.C. Maddison, arranged for the *Proceedings* of the Institute of Criminology (consisting mainly of reports of seminars) to be published by the Government Printing Office as being of value to his Department. Because of the interest shown in these publications, not only within the Attorney-General's Department but also by members of the judiciary, academics, social workers, the media, and interested citizens, a subject and author index up to and including publication 36 was published in 1980. This index has now been updated to include volume 60 (1984).

The Proceedings

Apart from the exceptions listed below each volume of *Proceedings* presents the papers and contributions to discussion at a seminar held by the Institute on a topic selected by its Advisory Committee. Papers are invited from several experts on the seminar topic, and these papers are circulated to the audience a few weeks preceding the seminar. The author of a paper has an opportunity to bring forward new material in presenting the paper to the seminar. In some instances prepared commentaries are made on the main papers, and again the commentator has the opportunity to add new material at the time of the seminar. After the formal presentation of papers the topic is open for discussion by those attending the seminar. In preparing the material for publication no attempt is made to edit the papers or comments to a standard style. The publications officer merely collates the material for publication with the minimum of editing; all principal authors having an opportunity to sight their contributions before printing.

Exceptions

- (a) Volumes 5 and 10. *The Sydney Project on Sentencing* Parts I and II was financed by the Walter E. Meyer Research Institute of Law. Part I is a demographic survey of 3,700 men receiving pre-sentence reports and appears in volume 5, pages 81 to 127. Part II a study on the prediction of success on Probation is published as Volume 10.
- (b) Volume 18. *Police Questioning and Confessional Statements* presents a summary *Statements* of the proceedings and a résumé of the discussions of the Advisory Committee in deliberations over five years examining the principles of law governing the admission of confessional statements from a judicial point of view; a consideration of how the law can best be complied with in the varying circumstances that occur in the investigation of crime; and the preparation of Draft Instructions for police officers on the conduct of interrogations and the taking of statements.
- (c) Volume 22. *Proposed Amendments to the N.S.W. Mental Health Act, 1958*, presents the proposals of the 1972 Mental Health Act Review Committee, followed by the discussion that took place at the seminar.

The Index

In the **Author Index** names are arranged alphabetically and subjects are listed alphabetically under each name, according to either the title of the paper or the subject of the seminar. When the contribution is to the "Discussion" the page numbers are marked with an asterisk. In the **Subject Index** under the title of the seminar, papers presented are shown in alphabetical order. Cross references to other volumes of *Proceedings* are indicated unless the title name is the same. The **Subject Index** title indicates the scope of the paper rather than the exact title of the paper itself. Because of interest in the public statements of such persons, contributions from members of the judiciary, of the Magistrates Bench, of the Probation and Parole Service and of the Police Force have not only been entered under subject but have also been grouped together in the **Subject Index** under the relevant heading for ease of reference. Under "Bibliography" are shown references which authors have listed at the end of their papers. It is more common for such references to appear as footnotes throughout each paper. Case histories, statistics and tables have been indexed as this might be useful for research and teaching purposes. Unless otherwise indicated entries listed under "Statistics" relate to New South Wales. No attempt has been made to provide an index of cases, to list all references to particular Acts, or to include detailed cross references.

The researcher will find most references to a subject either in one particular volume on that subject or in the volumes referred to under "*See also*". The general discussion at the seminars is not separately indexed, but contributions to discussion have been listed in the **Author Index**. In both Indexes the volume number of the *Proceedings* is printed in bold type, and in the **Subject Index** the volume title is in bold type.

Out of Print

It is regretted that a number of volumes are now out of print, and financial constraints have prevented reprinting. Reference copies are usually available at Federal, State and University libraries.
