Associate Professor Rosanne Taylor will be the University of Sydney's 2006 nomination for the Biological Sciences, Health and Related Studies - Carrick Award in Australian University Teaching. This is one of the eight categories for Awards in Teaching Excellence.

Associate Professor Taylor was selected from nominees across the Biological Science Faculties, including Medicine.

The Carrick Institute for Learning and Teaching in Higher Education was launched in 2004 to promote and advance learning and teaching in Australian higher education. The 2006 recipients will be announced in September 2006.

#### **Teaching and Learning Award**

Lecturers Drs Kate Bosward and Mark Krockenberger, Mr Gerard Marcus (Educational Developer and Instructional Designer - Thyne Reid Teaching Innovations Unit) and Mr Federico Costa (Faculty Web Services Coordinator), have won a Pearson Education UniServe Science Teaching Award for their project: Innovations in Veterinary Pathology Learning and Teaching. The award recognises in particular their development of eLearning activities to enhance students' learning experience and to improve learning outcomes.

The Faculty team's submission was considered outstanding and acknowledged as being firmly based on strong educational principles leading to the development of a very effective learning environment and ensuring their students are stimulated and motivated.


They will be presenting at the UniServe Science Annual Symposium at the University of Sydney later this year. The conference is a platform for presenting and developing high quality research in tertiary science teaching and learning.



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I have just returned from Hobart where I attended the Australian Veterinary Association Conference from 21-26 May 2006. The venue was excellent and Hobart is a beautiful city (my first visit). The conference was well attended (~600 delegates) and extremely well organised, and it was pleasing to see that our Faculty made a significant contribution to many areas on the scientific program. In particular our Chair of Farm Animal Health Professor Richard Whittington's plenary session on "Global Veterinary Defence" was first class and really made the audience take note of the need to think seriously about where the profession is headed and how to achieve greater diversity of our graduates. Senior Lecturer Dr Paul McGreevy (as the recipient of the AVA Excellence in Teaching Award) gave a tremendous presentation on the use of IT in his teaching. With seven sessions running concurrently, there was almost too much choice of educational and professional lectures to attend.

The only disappointing aspect of the conference was a new feature in the social program called "Meet the Deans" on Tuesday evening. Towards the end of the Happy Hour, each of the seven Australasian Deans was placed behind a sign of their Faculty to receive and talk to alumni. I positioned myself and waited for the rush, but after 40 minutes and only two delegates (who really only wanted to know where the bar was!) – I gracefully retired. Next year I will definitely need to do better!





Professor Leo Jeffcott

Professor Tom Scott, Director of the Poultry Research Foundation, has been announced as the new Sub Dean International for the Faculty. He will hold the position until December 2007.

Professor Scott's role focuses on:

- promoting internationalisation in the Faculty to maximise the international experience and engagement of both staff and students, and encouraging staff to internationalise their teaching curriculum and research interests
- providing support to international students
- assisting Associate Dean Students and the Faculty Manager with the development and implementation of an international marketing plan

## Australian Veterinary Association (AVA) Student Award

Dr Jillian Kelly, 2005 Sydney graduate, was awarded the AVA 2006 Don Kerr Veterinary Student Award at the recent annual conference.

The Award is given to a final year veterinary student for academic achievement and exceptional commitment to cattle medicine. The winner is selected by a panel of Deans, the Australian Cattle Veterinarian Association President and AVA President.

The Award commemorates the work of the late Dr Don Kerr, an enthusiastic cattle practitioner and dedicated educator of veterinary undergraduates, who died in 1992 while serving as AVA President.
