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2006 Partners in Veterinary Education Conference

The 4th Provet Partners in Veterinary Education Conference was held July 6th and 7th at the Veterinary Science Conference Centre, University of Sydney. Organised by the Faculty of Veterinary Science, the Conference provides continuing education, feedback and networking opportunities for veterinary practices and other partners involved in hosting University of Sydney final year veterinary students.

The Conference is a key part of the new curriculum at the University of Sydney and symbolises the importance of the partnership between the profession, the Faculty and major sponsor Provet.

There was a range of topics covered in the presentations this year. A highlight for many was the very entertaining and informative





session provided by Dr Paul Heinrich from the Pam McLean Cancer Communications Centre. Paul explained different learning styles and their application to student supervision and practice.

In addition there were presentations by Faculty members Leo Jeffcott and David Hodgson focusing on equine practice; John House, Imke Tammen and Peter Windsor on ruminant health and production; Kate Bosward and Paul Canfield presented on pathology and clinical pathology; Geraldine Hunt on small animal surgery and Glenn Shea reptiles.

The Conference is also about getting together with colleagues and friends each year. A feature is the Conference dinner also sponsored by Provet and held on Friday evening. This year Paul Canfield disguised as Sherlock Holmes revealed many of the darkest secrets of the Faculty through an entertaining after dinner quiz on the history of veterinary science at the University of Sydney.







Companion Animal Practitioner in Residence



Applications are invited from the University of Sydney, Faculty of Veterinary Science, Partners in Veterinary Education to complete the **Cenvet Companion Animal Practitioner in Residence Program.**

This 12 week program will provide opportunities for continuing education in companion animal clinical studies and veterinary undergraduate education. The successful applicant will participate in the delivery of clinical services and clinical instruction in the areas of Small Animal Medicine, Surgery and Anaesthesia at the University Veterinary Centre Sydney.

Criteria

Applicants must be registered with the NSW Veterinary Surgeons Board, have a current licence to use radiation apparatus and be participants in the Faculty of Veterinary Science Partners in Veterinary Education Year 5 Program. They will need to demonstrate:

- Commitment to student education
- Commitment to continuing education
- Willingness to enter into a contractual agreement with the UVCS to provide clinical services to the UVCS
- Willingness to participate in other prescribed activities related to the aims of the program

The successful applicant will receive an allowance of \$13,000. The 12 week program is to be completed before July 2007.
